THE 3RD NATIONAL STUDENT DEBATE COMPETITION 2015



On Tuesday June 15th 2015, 16 debate teams representing as many Jordanian universities participated in **Usharek's 3rd National Student Debate Competition**, at the University of Jordan.

With the attendance of **over 500 university students**, university deans, professors, representatives from the Parliament and Civil Society Organizations, Usharek students debated current and important topics, including internet censorship in Jordan, the single-non transferable vote system, the political parties draft law and the "Tawjihi" exam system.

The Competition started off with qualifying debates, with eight winners qualified to compete in the quarter-final debates. At this stage the debates were dominated by teams from big public universities, winning six spots in the quarter finals. In similar fashion, public universities secured three out of four spots in the semi-finals, with Jadara University being the only private university in the semis.

The final debate brought an epic showdown between two southern universities, Mu'ta and Tafilah Technical. The latter clinched victory with 0.3 points margin, which was the closest call of the day.

NORTH YOUTH FORUM: FUTURE OF NATIONAL LISTS

"National Lists should be voted for in terms of programs not members"

On Tuesday, May 19th, Ana Usharek conducted the North Youth forum on "The Future of National Lists" at Yarmouk University. 70 students from four northern universities took part in the forum, which brought together legislators and youth to address National Lists within the Election Law. The forum featured a presentation by Usharek+ campaign "My List is My Country" from Jordan University for Science and Technology that advocates for allocating additional seats for National Lists.

MP Wafa Bani Mustafa discussed Article 67 of the Jordanian constitution that is concerned with parliamentary Election Law. She noted the importance of consulting the constitutional court on legislative issues related to parliamentary elections. In a discussion with students she expressed her belief that Jordan is ready for a modernized election law.

Moreover, MP Motaz Abu Rumman expressed that National Lists have clearer programs and than individual candidates, and that issues like voting for the most qualified candidates would be met with National Lists, since Jordan would be one electorate and people would be able vote for the most qualified regardless of their residency. MP Abu Rumman also supported the idea of having 50% of the seats in the Parliament be allocated for National Lists.

Students' recommendations to the Election Law:

- Allocating 30% of the seats to National Lists as a start.
- Increasing the number of seats allocated to National Lists to 50% of the seats in the Parliament, as a next step.
- Forming National Lists by political parties.
- The National Lists should take into consideration geographical distribution.
- Lowering the age of candidacy to 25 years.

ANA USHAREK STUDENTS FROM CENTRAL REGION'S UNIVERSITIES DRAFT RECOMMENDATIONS TO AMEND THE PRESS AND PUBLICATIONS LAW

On Tuesday, May 26th at Zaytonah University. The forum brought together Media experts and 60 students from seven universities to address issues with the current press and publication law, primarily its impact on freedom of speech.

Speakers at the event were:

- Jamil Al Nimri Member of Parliament
- Abdullah Tawalbeh Assistant Director of Jordan's Media Commission
- Mosab Shawabkeh Investigative journalist at Al Balad Radio
- Wael Jaraisheh Journalist at Ammon News

MP Jamil Al-Nimri discussed the role of media in democracy and in Jordan. He explained that members of Parliament knew very little about the law and its affect when endorsing it two years ago. He added that restricting free media would not in his opinion prevent citizens from seeking the truth. Dr. Tawalbeh, representing the government, said that the Jordanian government has always had dialogue with journalists. He stressed on the importance of regulating the press to protect citizens and journalists from those who misuse media. Mr. Shawabkeh had a different opinion, promoting the idea of self-regulation among journalists. He also stressed on the importance of free media through a less restrictive law. Mr. Jaraisheh pointed out some violations made by smaller new websites and supported having regulations made by the government regarding the registration of these websites.



Students issued recommendations that reflected the views of Jordanian youth on the use of social media and the operation of news websites:

- The Journalists association should be involved in drafting and amending the law
- News websites that violate the law must be given a notice first, and then a financial penalty rather than an immediate close down.



ANA USHAREK STUDENTS FROM EAST REGION'S UNIVERSITIES DRAFT RECOMMENDATIONS TO INCREASE WOMEN'S POLITICAL PARTICIPATION

Ana Usharek conducted the East Youth forum "Women's Political Participation" on Wednesday, May 27th at Zarqa Private University. 60 students participated from four universities in the East region. The forum brought women activists and elected municipal members together with youth to discuss the political role of women in local communities, women's representation in partisan and parliamentary life.

An'am Asha (Legal Activist and member of Women's Solidarity Institution TADAMON) discussed the social dimension and impact on the political status of women, noting that social factors do affect the overall perception of the role of women in the political life, and that was reflected in legislations.

Jamilah Mashaqbah (Hashmeiyah municipal council member) stressed on the significance of women insisting on their own rights and pushing for more representation in political life.

Hayat Al Zawahreh (Zarqa municipal council member) stated that education is a corner stone in this issue, as educated Women are more aware of their rights and can do a better job by raising awareness in all fields.

Students issued recommendations that reflect the views of Jordanian youth about the participation of women in politics in general with focus on Zarqa and Mafraq governorates as they are seen as less developed than other governorates.

- Allocating a percentage of municipal budgets to support women developmental projects
- Increasing women quota in municipal councils to %50 of seats
- Exerting more media coverage for Women who have succeeded in elections
- Encouraging women's caucus in parliament to deliberate and push for laws that are related to women 's participation in politics

MEET OUR GRADUATES



Ahmad Adawi moved to Karak to pursue a Bachelor's degree in Mechanical Engineering at Mutah University. During his studies, he joined Ana Usharek and Usharek+ programs where he led one very important campaign against campus violence at his university. What drove Ahmad and his Usharek+ colleagues to advocate for this campaign was the tragic death of their colleague during a fight on campus.

Ahmad and the team used theatrical plays and art to gather support. They gathered over 2000 signatures requesting a change in the law to include a rehabilitation plan instead of expelling the students who participate in violent acts.

Today Ahmad heads an elected committee for a registered initiative that he and his colleagues established after graduating from Usharek Programs. Their initiative "Athar for Youth Development" has over 200 volunteers and over 2000 Facebook members combating violence at universities in Jordan. Ahmad has recently joined Usharek's team of trainers as an intern.



When **Rawan Azem** was studying at Hashemite university, she didn't expect that joining Ana Usharek and Usharek+ programs at the university would be the first step towards a successful career.

Rawan and her fellow Usharek+ students conducted a campaign to stop child labor. The campaign allowed students to work in different governorates and with different organizations and decision makers which expanded their network, enriched their knowledge and provided them with hands on experience in advocacy management.

Today, Rawan is not only a leading trainer on debate skills, but also a judge in EU debate competitions. Rawan also workes on different development projects around Jordan.



January 14 marked the beginning of the Usharek+ Winter School of Politics. The school brought together 200 Usharek+ students to participate in a three-days workshop of comprehensive events and communication training sessions, taking place in Wadi Musa.

The training sessions conducted during the winter school are a continuation of the Usharek+ advocacy campaign training curricula, in which students apply the skills they learn to their advocacy campaigns.

Students at the winter school attend sessions on events planning, traditional media, media relations and communication skills, during which they create strategic plans for their events, hold press conferences and rehearse for TV interviews. Students also learn how to draw attention of journalists to their advocacy campaigns using emails, Facebook and Twitter. They also practice to present their messages to public figures and civil society leaders.

"Participating in the Winter School has added a lot to my knowledge of media relations. I am confident that we will manage to attract high media coverage to our campaign now that we completed this training" Mujahed Qazan-Jordan University of Science and Technology

Online Without Boarders

"According to the Jordanian Constitution, each Jordanian is entitled to freedom of speech. However, our Press and publications Law (2012) denies Jordanians that freedom." Rahma Mohammad, Usharek+ student from Yarmouk University stated during the opening of the "Online Without Boarders" campaign launching event.

The current Jordanian Press and Publications law holds the owner of a blog or a website responsible for any comment made by users on their blog or website. Students believe that this will limit practices related to open dialogue, conflicting against freedom of press and speech.

The event started with a short video of interviews featuring Law Professor Maha Khasawneh, Editor Lina Ejelat from 7iber.com, Journalism Professor Ali Al-Zainat from Yarmouk University, Editor Sonya Zghoul from Amman.net and Deputy Editor Wael Jaraiseh from Ammon news.

The event featured MP Jamil Al-Nimri, member of the Parliamentary Administrative Committee and the Media committee; Journalist Yehya Al-Shoqair; a Columnist at Al-Arab daily newspaper; Abd Al-Rahman Al-Sharayreh, Lawyer and activist from MELAD Unite; Khaled Foukhadeh, Al-Rai daily newspaper and Ahkelak online news website, and Saif Obaidat, Deputy Editor at Saraya online news website.

MP Jamil said: "I believe we need a brand new law rather than amending the current law" he added that "This is a good time for students to lobby for changes in the law considering that it is currently being discussed at the Parliament".





Everything but My Freedom, Shylock

Students running this campaign organized an outdoor activity at Hashemite University to gather the support of students and to spread awareness about their campaign which calls for amending (Law 36 Article 22-c) in the Executive Law to correspond to the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, which states that "No one shall be imprisoned merely on the ground of inability to fulfill a contractual obligation".

Students set up their campaign banner in a high-traffic area on campus and invited students to learn about their campaign and to join their efforts by signing the campaign wall and by joining their social media channels.

Students plan to move forward with the support they gathered by meeting with organizations to join efforts in amending this law.

My Right to Protection

The event which was held at Philadelphia University brought together MP Falak Al-Jamaani, Lawyer Lubna Al-Dawani Director of Sisterhood is Global Institute SIGI-Jordan, Professor Moutaz Al-Shaikh Salem, President of Philadelphia University and Professor Osama Al-Naimat, Dean of the Faculty of Law.

Students and guests engaged in an open discussion on activating Jordan's Reform and Rehabilitation Centers Law No. 9 (8-4), to separate the administratively detained from the judicially arrested in prisons. They also touched on cases related to placing women who are deemed to be threatened by their families in separate shelters, and granting them the petition for their own release.

Students succeeded in spreading awareness about the current law. Guests added their signatures on the campaign wall with promises to join efforts towards amending the law.





No to Nuclear Reactor

Students leading this campaign from Mutah University call for the protection of Jordanians from the dangers of nuclear energy. During the event, students highlighted that one minor accident at the plant could poison up to a third of the water in the country and could cause death, burns, and serious public health problems. Students also pointed out that the cost of nuclear energy is high and would contaminate Jordan's scarce water supply. For that, they favor the use of renewable energy such as the solar power and wind energy.

Students invited MP Hind Al-Fayez, MP Mahmoud Kharabsheh, MP Fares Al-Gsous, MP Mustafa Al-Rawashdeh and campaign partner Mr. Jamal Al-Nawayseh, the President of the Renewable Energy and Environment Investment Association to a debate followed by a discussion on the topic.

Students collected over 140 signatures against the nuclear power plants. Guests expressed their support to the campaign in future activities.








