

## Six Simple Questions to Identify Your Complexity-Aware Monitoring Need

This worksheet is a starting point for the design of a trial of a complexity-aware monitoring approach. The questions below help you outline the purpose, scope and intended uses for the trial. The Complexity-Aware M&E Team will work with you throughout the design process.

<b>Description of Project</b> Who is the project's <b>main target</b> group?	
What changes or <b>improvements</b> is the project being used to bring about for the target group?	
How is the <b>project contributing</b> to the desired changes? What activities does it use?	
What does complexity look like in your project?	<b>Cause and effect</b> are poorly understood thereby making it difficult to identify solutions and draft detailed implementation plans in advance.

please provide a brief explanation. Continued on the next page.	Stakeholders bring diverse perspectives to the situation, making consensus about the development problem and/or solution elusive or impractical.

What does complexity look like in your project? (Continued)	The purpose of the project is to create a <b>new solution</b> to either an intractable or a new problem; the solution is unknown when the project begins.

**Describe your monitoring needs**: No single monitoring approach can solve all of your project's monitoring needs. A successful trial will provide timely information to address one significant, but feasible monitoring need. You may want to consider the information needs for one main decision point and/or key decision maker.

For each of the ways that complexity works in your project, please describe a monitoring need <u>not</u> met by the project's current monitoring system.
The monitoring need should describe information required for decision making.
Who will use the monitoring data from the complexity-aware monitoring trial?
How will they use the data?
What specific questions do you need answered?
